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

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Good Reasons to Study the Law

- ✓ To legally support the decisions that you make associated with physical therapy practice
- ✓ To avoid finding yourself in violation of the law because "I just didn't know!"
- ✓ Educate others about the practice of physical therapy

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The purpose of the Practice Act and the Rules is to protect the public.

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Accountability

PTs and PTAs licensed in Tennessee are accountable to:

- Practice Act
- Rules
- Board Policies (or Policy Statements)



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Board of Physical Therapy

Often referred to as the "licensing board"

An entity of the state government, specifically the Department of Health

Members are appointed by the governor

Made up of 3 PTs, 1 PTA, and a public member

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APTATN and the Board of Physical Therapy are NOT one in the same.



Board of Physical Therapy

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Board of Physical Therapy

- Regulates the practice of physical therapy per the Practice Act and the Rules
- Reviews qualifications and issues licenses
- Interprets issues related to practice
- Takes disciplinary action

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Board Administrator

Is an employee of the state of Tennessee

Administers the day-to-day operations of the board

Must follow procedures established by Board

Cannot make policy or interpret issues

“IGNORANCE OF THE LAW IS NO EXCUSE.”

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The Practice Act (TCA 63-13-10X-50X) is the collective statutes that govern physical therapy (and occupational therapy) practice in TN. The Practice Act:

- Is established by the state legislature.
- Can be amended at any time.
- Has five parts with subsections.
 - Part 1 101-102 titles the **Practice Act** and provides the legislative purpose

The Practice Act

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The Practice Act cont.

Part 1 63-13-103: Defines who can practice occupational therapy or physical therapy.

- (12) – Defines “onsite supervision”
- (13 – 20) – Defines physical therapist and physical therapist assistant and limitedly describes the scope of practice for each.

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The Practice Act cont.

Part 1 63-13-104:

Defines further the legal scope of practice of physical therapists and assistants

- **Referral sources** – doctor of medicine, chiropractic, dentistry, podiatry; or osteopathy, nurse practitioner or physician assistant
- **Direct thrust** – Prohibits thrust beyond normal range and the limits of anatomical integrity

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The Practice Act cont.

(Part 2 is related only to occupational therapy.)

Part 3 63-13-301 through 318:

- Defines the **licensure** requirements, application process, applicant qualifications for PTs and PTAs; licensure renewal, reinstatement (301, 306-309)
- Holds licensees accountable to the **ethical standards of the profession** (302)
- Defines **direct access (303)** – more on next slide

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63-13-303 Direct Access

A physical therapist may:

- (A) Conduct an initial patient visit without referral
- (B) Provide physical assessments or instructions . . . to an asymptomatic person . . .
- (C) In emergency circumstances . . . provide assistance to the best of . . . ability
- (D) **Treat a patient without a referral, within the scope of practice of physical therapy**

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63-13-303 DA cont.

(D) **Treat a patient without a referral, within the scope of practice of physical therapy when the following conditions are met:**

- If no progress is made within 30 days – Cease services and refer
- If progress is made – May continue without consulting a healthcare provider
 - Beyond 90 days, however, the patient's healthcare provider must be consulted

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63-13-303 DA cont.

(D) **Treat a patient without a referral, within the scope of practice of physical therapy when the following conditions are met:**

- The above do not apply if patient has been previously diagnosed with a chronic condition
- Refers patient at any time if symptoms or conditions become beyond the scope of practice of the PT

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The Practice Act cont.

Part 3 63-13-301 through 318 continued:

- Term protection (305, 310) with the appropriate exemptions for PT or PTA students
- Defines supervision requirements for students and assistive personnel (311)
- Defines the Board of Physical Therapy and delegates the power and authority of the Board including disciplinary actions and assigning penalties, establishing fees (304, 312-316, 318)
- Delineates patient disclosures (317)

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The Practice Act cont.

Part 4 63-13-401 through 402:

➤ Defines the purpose for and the requirements of physical therapy licensure compact


- Must have an unencumbered license in state of residence that is a compact state
- Compact privilege must be with another compact state(s)
- Must comply with practice laws of all applicable states

(Part 5 is the OT Compact language.)

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The "General Rules Governing the Practice of Physical Therapy" (Chapter 1150-01-.01-.23) is a companion document to the Practice Act and is applicable to all TN licensed PTs and PTAs.

- The Board of PT writes the Rules to interpret and clarify the Practice Act. A revision was recently completed and is now in effect (as of 12/29/2025).

The Rules

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The Rules Section .01 - .02

➤ 1150-01.01 – Definitions

- Telemedicine has been added here.

➤ 1150-01.02 – Scope of Practice

- Scope of practice (1)(a) – The Rules refer the licensee to 63-13-303 (direct access) and are essentially as we discussed with the Practice Act
- (1)(b) – Practice of physical therapy is defined including substandard care
 - Overutilization
 - Unwarranted treatment
 - Treating beyond reasonable benefit
 - Abandonment
 - Failed to practice in accordance to practice standards

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Direct Access Case Example

A patient comes to your clinic with back pain as the result of a MVA. He tells you that he does not want you to tell his doctor about PT. You have him sign a consent form and place it in his patient record.

You tell him that you will not be able to treat him longer than ___ days unless you consult with his doctor. You also inform him that if as of ___ days he is not making progress you must stop treatment and refer him.

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Scope of Practice Case Example

After a patient evaluation in an outpatient setting, the PT delegated the treatment to a PTA. The POC included ther ex, gait training, and ther activities.

The PTA treated the patient x 3 and then found patient's pain report to be increasing. The PTA added cont. US to the pain point with the proper parameters. The PTA documented and billed the US appropriately. This continued for 2 weeks.

What are the scope of practice issues here for the PTA? For the PT?

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Section .02 Supervision

➤ (2) Supervision - PTA

- All services must be under the supervision of a PT with a **written** POC in place.
- PT must perform 30 day treatment plan re-eval; 60 day **inspection** of care.
- PT may not supervise PTA delivering care greater than 60 miles or 1 hour away.
- The supervising PT must be readily available by telecommunications or other means.
- The DC evaluation and summary must be written by the PT.

Question: Who is responsible for all of the above?

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Section .02 Supervision

➤ Supervision – Assistive personnel

- PT aides may be used for tasks “that do not require clinical decision making” with direct supervision of an onsite PT or PTA with the PT being responsible for documentation

ONSITE SUPERVISION per the Rules:

- Continuously onsite and present
- **Immediately available**
- Maintain continued involvement

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Section .02 Supervision

- PTs may supervise 3 FTE of PTAs
- PTs may supervise 2 FTE of PT aides
- PTAs may supervise 2 FTE of PT aides
- PTs and PTAs may supervise students and volunteers
 - Students – PTs can supervise PT or PTA students; PTAs can supervise PTA students
 - Must have at least one year of licensed clinical experience to be a clinical instructor
 - Volunteers may not provide any physical therapy services to patients

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Supervision Case Example

Mary works in a small rural hospital setting. The PT department employs 3 full-time PTs and 5 full-time PTAs. One PT is currently out on maternity leave; the department director who is a PT calls in sick for the day. All 5 PTAs are scheduled to work that day. What should Mary do?

- 1) Close the department for the day
- 2) Notify the Board of PT of the special circumstances for the department and proceed with care
- 3) Remove 2 PTAs from direct patient care for the day if no other PT can be called in
- 4) Obtain the hospital administrator's permission to treat patients as usual

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Sections .03 - .08 Licensure

1150-01.03-.11 – All relate to licensure

- Unchanged in most areas
- **Section .03** – term protection, correct titles
- **Section .04-.05** – qualification and procedures for licensure
- **Section .06** – NEW fee schedule
- **Section .07** – application review
- **Section .08** - examination

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Sections .09 - .10

- **Section .09 – Licensure Renewal**
 - Due date is the expiration date located on the license certificate.
- **Section .10 – Provisional License**
 - A provisional or restricted license requires that the PT or PTA work under the direction of a currently licensed PT for a designated period of time.

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Section .11

- **Section .11 Retirement, Inactive**
 - Processes are described here
 - You cannot practice PT or imply that you are actively licensed in Tennessee.
 - You do not have to pay renewal fee.

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Section .11 cont.

- **Section .11 continued** – To reactivate a license:
 - Submit a written request.
 - Pay fees for renewal and reinstatement.
 - Complete the continuing competence requirements.
- The Board of Physical Therapy has the discretion to require additional education, supervised clinical practice, or successful passage of licensure examination.

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Section .12 Continuing Competence

Must occur in the 24 months that precede the licensure renewal month

- “Planned learning experiences . . . beyond the entry level educational requirements . . .”
- **30 hours per licensure cycle are required**
 - 20 hours must be from Class I activities
 - 10 hours may be from Class II activities
 - Class I hours must include 2 hours of ethics and 2 hours of jurisprudence (courses must have been approved by APTATN).

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Continuing Competence cont.

- Relevant courses must relate to physical therapy
 - Intervention, examination, research, documentation, education, management, **leadership**, or other content area
- Ethics and jurisprudence (2 hrs each)
 - **NOTE:** Licensees in the initial period of licensure only need E and J

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Section .12 Class I Examples

Class I examples – at least 20 contact hours

- Peer review
 - External (20 hrs/review, 1 per cycle)
 - Internal (2 hrs/review, 2 per cycle)

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Class I examples cont.

- Courses, seminars, workshops, symposia
 - **Note: Online and live stipulations previously included here have been deleted.**
- University credit courses (12 hrs/credit hr)
- Participation as a presenter in the approved courses (max 20 contact hrs)
- Adjunct teaching in a PT or PTA program (max 20 hrs)

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Class I examples cont.

- Advanced degree (max 24 in year degree is awarded)
- Participating in a clinical residency or fellowship (5 hrs/wk, max 26 per the program)
- Authorship of a scientific poster (10 hrs per event)
- Certification of clinical specialization (26 hrs in 2-year period certification or recertification is awarded)

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Course Approvals

NOTE: Courses, seminars, workshops, symposia must be approved

- Approved by APTA or its academies/sections, FSBPT, APTATN, accredited PT and/or PTA programs
- **NOTE: Other state chapters of APTA are no longer an approval source.**
- You can still complete an individual application for approval.

All APTATN approved courses are listed on the APTATN website (www.tptaonline.org).

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Section .12 Class II Examples

- **Class II examples – 10 contact hours**
 - Self-study (max 1 hr)
 - Clinical instructor (max 1 hours for every 16 contact hrs)
 - Study group (max 1 hr)
 - House of Delegates rep (max 4 hrs)
 - Attending a Board meeting (max 1 hr)
 - Active APTA membership (max 1 hr)

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Section .12 Unacceptable CEU Activities

- See Rules for more specific information
 - Trainings that are not specific to physical therapy practice
 - Example – CPR
 - Visiting exhibits at conferences

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Section .12 Documentation of Compliance

- Must be uploaded into CE Broker by the end of licensure cycle
- Maintain evidence for 5 years

Falsely reporting can result in serious disciplinary action!

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Section .13 Advertising

1150-01-.13 specifically defines the expectations for advertising of your services

The following are strictly prohibited:

- Claims that your services are superior
- Claims of services that are beyond or outside of the scope of practice
- "Bait and switch" offers
- Misrepresentation of credentials
- Failure to publicly display all licensee's licenses

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Section .14

1150-01-.14 – Code of Ethics

The Rules state that the Board of PT adopts for TN physical therapy licensees the **APTA Code of Ethics**.

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Section .15 Disciplinary Actions

1150-01-.15 The Board of PT considers violations of the Practice Act or Rules to be **serious offenses** and per the Rules may take any of the following actions:

- ✓ Letters of warning
- ✓ **Formal censure or reprimand**
- ✓ **Probation with conditions**
- ✓ **Licensure suspension**
- ✓ **Licensure revocation**

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Section .15 continued

- **Conditions** may be required
 - CEU requirements from 40-50 hours in ethics, jurisprudence, documentation, supervision, & Medicare regulations
 - Quarterly performance reports from their supervisor to the licensing board
- **Penalties** may also be required
 - Significant fines based upon the type of civil penalty determined by the Board
 - These are defined in the Rules

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Violations Example

Scope of Practice

- Practicing physical therapy in violation of the practice act or any rule or written order adopted by the Board
- Practicing or offering to practice beyond the scope of practice

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Violations Example

Patient Records

Failure to maintain adequate records:

- Physical therapy evaluation
- Physical therapy treatment diagnosis
- POC including desired outcomes
- Treatment record
- Results of interventions
- Discharge plan
- Patient identification information



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Violations Example

Patient Records

Position Statement on PT Discharge Evaluations/Summaries

The Board of PT recognizes that in some situations a patient's discharge is out of control of the PT.

- A discharge plan, evaluation, or summary is required for every patient record.

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Violations Example

Substandard Care

- Substandard care by a PT or PTA due to ignorance, incompetence, or a deliberate or negligent act or failure to act
- Substandard care by a PTA, which includes exceeding the authority to perform the task selected and delegated by the supervising PT

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Violation Example

Substandard Care

- Over-utilization or underutilization
- Intervention unwarranted by the patient's condition
- Treatment beyond the point of reasonable benefit
- Abandonment without informing of other options

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Violations Example

Inadequate Supervision

- Inadequately supervising or delegating duties which exceed the scope of practice for support personnel
 - PTAs
 - Assistive Personnel – onsite supervision
 - Students, volunteers – onsite supervision
- Aiding or abetting a person not licensed who directly or indirectly performs activities requiring a license

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Violations Example

Ethics

- Failure to adhere to the standards of ethics of the physical therapy profession
- The Rules adopt the:
 - APTA Code of Ethics for the Physical Therapist and the Physical Therapist Assistant

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Violations Example

Competence Issues

- Practicing while impaired by drugs or alcohol

Note: DUI Conviction

- Must report to Board
- Monitoring by Tennessee Professional Assistance Program (TNPAP)
- May jeopardize credentialing for reimbursement for services



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Violations Example

Competence Issues

- Having been judged mentally incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction
- Disciplinary action taken against license held in another state
- **Failure to meet the continuing competence requirements**

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Violations Example

Patient Confidentiality

- Failure to maintain patient confidentiality without prior written consent or unless otherwise required by law
 - Suspected child abuse must be reported to Child Protective Services (1-800-422-4453)
 - Suspected abuse of dependent older adults & people with disabilities must be reported to Adult Protective Services (1-800-677-1116)

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Violations Example

Sexual Misconduct

- Engaging in or soliciting sexual relationships, consensual or non-consensual, while a PT/PTA relationship with a patient exists
- Making sexual advances, requesting sexual favors, and engaging in verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature with patients
- Intentionally viewing a disrobed patient if not related to care

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Violations Example

Criminal Issues



- Conviction of a felony
- Interfering with an investigation or disciplinary proceeding by willful misrepresentation of facts or by the use of threats
- Violation or assisting or conspiring to violate any provisions of the practice act, rules, or criminal statute

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Violations Example

Fraud

- Medicare, Medicaid, and insurance regulation make fraud a federal issue
- Fraud and deceit in obtaining a license or in maintaining a license for practice
- Requesting, receiving or participating in the dividing, transferring, assigning, rebating or refunding of an unearned fee
- Charging unreasonable or fraudulent fees for services performed or not performed

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Violations Example

Fraud

- Making misleading, deceptive, untrue or fraudulent representations
- Promoting unnecessary devices, intervention or service for financial gain
- Fee splitting for patient referral
- Payment or acceptance of commissions on fees for services or articles supplied to patients

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Violations Example

False Advertising

- The Rules contain comprehensive requirements to promote "truth in advertising"

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Violations Example

Reporting Requirement

- Failure to report any act or omission of a licensee, applicant, or any other person, which violates the provisions of the Practice Act or Rules
 - Complaints are filed with the **Office of Investigations**

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Violations Example

Reporting Requirement

- Issues Not Within Board Authority
 - Fees and/or billing disputes (amounts charged for services, overcharges, etc.)
 - Insurance matters (unless it deals with fraud by a practitioner)

These types of complaints should go to Office of **Consumer Affairs** at 1-800-342-8385

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Violations Example

Reporting Requirement

- Employing illegal aliens
- Delinquency in child support payments
- Defaulting on student loans

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Disciplinary actions are public record!

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The Rules continued

- **Section .16 – Replacement of license**
- **Section .17 – Change of address or name**
- **Section .18 – Release of records**
- **Section .19 – Board meetings, officers, consultants**
- **Section .20 – Consumer Right to Know**
- **Section .21 – Peer Assistance (TNPap)**

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Section .20 Right to Know

- **Section 1150-01-.20:**
 - PTs must inform the patient of any financial arrangements connected to the referral process
 - PTs must disclose in writing any financial interest in products they recommend or endorse to their patients
 - PTs have the responsibility to ensure that the patient has knowledge of freedom of choice in services & products

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Section .22 Dry Needling

- **Section 1150-01.22:**
 - May only be performed by a PT
 - New graduate PTs cannot practice dry needling unless educational compliance has been met during educational coursework
 - CEU evidence must be submitted to the Board
 - **Cannot be delegated to PTAs, students, or support personnel**
 - DN specific information must be provided to the patient by the PT

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Dry Needling Courses

Dry Needling Courses are reviewed and approved by the Board directly.

The provider must provide to the Board of PT administrator:

- Name of the course provider
- Synopsis and description of the course
- Copy or description of any course materials used

Must specify what anatomical regions are included and describe whether it offers introductory or advanced instruction

NOTE: PTs who obtained dry needling training in another state or country must provide this same information to the Licensing Board administrator for approval.

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More on Dry Needling

Educational Requirements: In person CEU requirement (50 hrs)

- Musculoskeletal and Neuromuscular systems
- Anatomical basis of pain mechanisms, chronic pain, and referred pain
- Trigger Points
- Universal Precautions

(These are generally satisfied in PT school now.)

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More on Dry Needling

Educational Requirements continued:

24 hours of dry needling with specific instruction in:

- Dry needling technique
- Dry needling indications and contraindications
- Documentation of dry needling
- Management of adverse effects
- Practical psychomotor competency
- OSHA's Bloodborne Pathogen Protocol

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Section .23 Telemedicine

➤ 1150-01.23 – New

- Obligates licensees to the duties, scope of practice, standards of care for PTs and PTAs per the Practice Act and Rules and ensure patient consent and adequate communication.
- This section also defines compliance for telemedicine:
 - (a) Must have an active TN license or compact privileges in practice telemedicine in TN
 - (b) Must be licensed in state where patient resides
 - (c) Must abide by Board's law and regulations
 - (d) Must abide by all other state and federal laws, rules, and regulations

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Board of PT Policy Statements

From time to time, the Board of Physical Therapy develops policies that attempt to clarify issues regarding the practice of physical therapy. These policies assist in interpreting the Practice Act and Rules.

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies

1. Renewal for Licensees Called to Active Military Duty (4-10-03): Special consideration for license renewal for military personnel called to active duty.
2. Multidisciplinary Health Screening (9-14-98): Health screenings outside of the scope of practice are unsafe to the public and may subject the licensee to disciplinary action.

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

3. Lapsed License (3-10-16):
 - If the license is not renewed, a PT or PTA may not practice legally after the expiration date.
 - If the license has been expired for less than 30 days, you may apply for reinstatement of your license (Regular Renewal Fee, Late Renewal Fee, & Reinstatement Fee).

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

3. Lapsed License (continued): If you keep practicing from 30 days to 6 months:
- You will receive a citation which is reported as a disciplinary action on your practitioner profile.
 - You may apply for reinstatement of license (Regular Renewal Fee, Late Renewal Fee, Reinstatement Fee, and a fine of \$250 per month).

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

3. Lapsed License (continued):
- If you practice more than 6 months after the expiration date, your case will go to the office of investigations as a complaint of unlicensed practice and will be handled by the Office of General Counsel.

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

****Other Consequences of a Lapsed License****

Medicare rules require that physical therapy be rendered by a licensed PT or PTA.

Healthcare facility may have to pay money back to Medicare for services the PT/PTA rendered because they were practicing without a license.

Unhappy employer ??? Your job security ???

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

4. Home Health Aides (2-11-05):
- The monitoring of home health aides by physical therapy practitioners is not in itself a violation of the Physical Therapy Practice Act and the Rules if no other ethical or practice violations are present.

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

5. Fingerstick Techniques (8-20-10):
- Performing fingerstick techniques (such as glucometer readings, coumadin readings, etc.) is within the scope of practice of a PT or PTA if such activities are performed and called for during the course of the practice of physical therapy, as provided under the Practice Act.

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

6. Continuing Competence (2-9-17) – Failure to comply with the requirement:
- If a PT has at least 8 hours or a PTA has at least 8 hours**
 - Civil penalty of \$100 per hour he/she is lacking and must be paid within 30 days
 - Make up the deficient hours

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A Review of Current Board of PT Policies cont.

7. Continuing Competence (continued)
- **If a PT has less than 8 hours or a PTA has less than 8 hours**
 1. Civil penalty of \$100 per hour he/she is lacking and must be paid within 30 days
 2. Make up the deficient hours
 3. License will be suspended at least 45 days and will continue to be suspended until hours are made up

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Why study the law and rules that govern our practice?

This knowledge will keep you from inadvertently violating the law.

If you are asked to do something illegal by an employer, knowledge of these documents arms you so that you can work with the employer to change their practice.

These documents can help support the decisions you make associated with your physical therapy practice.
